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Great turnout for 'Tackling Ageing' events



Over 330 of you took part in our recent ageism survey and last month, the Commissioner met with more than 200 older people from across Northern Ireland to hear first-hand their views and experiences on ageism.

Visiting Antrim, Downpatrick, Armagh, Omagh, Fermanagh and Derry/Londonderry, the Commissioner and his team heard many examples of ageism from the participants. The survey also revealed that older people right across Northern Ireland believe ageist attitudes are very much present in today's society.

The Commissioner said, "I heard some shocking experiences of ageism at every single one of the events I hosted. There's no doubt in my mind that ageism remains one of the most accepted forms of discrimination in our society and I believe there is much more work to be done on tackling this."

The Commissioner will be publishing a summary report of the survey findings early next year, alongside some of the anonymised experiences that were shared at the events.

Antrim welcomes new 'chatty

benches'

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The Commissioner had the pleasure of launching two of the newest 'Chatty Benches' in Antrim. Beautifully hand crafted from recycled timber, by members of AMH New Horizon's Antrim (Steeple) Men's Sheds, the benches are designed to offer a comfortable perch for a natter by people using green spaces at Regional Office, Antrim and on the Holywell Hospital site.

The Commissioner said: "Loneliness continues to be a big issue for many people and can have such a negative effect on a person's mental health and wellbeing. The chatty bench is a wonderful initiative, which offers so much more than just a place to sit – it provides an opportunity for social connection, which can have a positive influence on our health, mental health, life expectancy and wellbeing. It's great to see another chatty bench being installed in Northern Ireland, and I hope that people will embrace the idea and use the opportunity to spark up a conversation and enjoy a chat with someone they don't know."

Positive about ageing

October is positive ageing month bringing an opportunity to celebrate all that is positive about ageing. In a research paper by Dr Becca Levy (Professor of Epidemiology at the Yale School of Public Health and Professor of Psychology at Yale University) a positive mindset about ageing was shown to increase life span by up to seven years.

This research also showed that those who have positive perceptions about ageing also experience much higher rates of recovery from illness and injury, have better brain performance, improved memory, a greater sense of control over their lives, a greater will to live and are more likely to talk to a doctor about health problems, get preventive care such as blood pressure screenings and their flu jab. Throughout our recent ageism events we found that many older people had lots of positive things to say about getting older, just some of the words they used are captured in the word cloud above.

New scam awareness campaign

launched for older people

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The ScamwiseNI Partnership has launched a campaign to help empower older people and those who are not regularly online to stay safe against scammers.

The six-month long initiative aims to raise awareness and educate the public by using more traditional media to reach older people who may not be online as often. The campaign material will feature on radio and newspaper advertisements, along with posters in public transport spaces, including bus shelters and inside buses.

Engagement round up

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Autumn has been a busy season of engagements for the Commissioner, as well as hosting our 'Tackling ageism' events in each county, the Commissioner travelled across Northern Ireland for a range of events.

Starting off in September the Commissioner joined a range of speakers at Queens University Belfast's Inaugural Dementia Conference, which focused on 'Caring for today, living for tomorrow'. The Commissioner made an address to an audience of healthcare workers who provide care to people with dementia in a clinical setting or in the community, highlighting three main areas for planning for tomorrow: Diagnosis, infrastructure and support.

At the end of September the Commissioner travelled to Irvinestown, Co Fermanagh to meet with members of the South West Age Partnership (SWAP). SWAP's main objective is to work in partnership with statutory agencies to deliver services for older people in the Fermanagh and Omagh area. Discussion on the bus pass, GP appointments, loneliness and the need for better support for Older People Groups were addressed at the meeting.

The Commissioner travelled to the Causeway Coast and Glenn's on two occasions, firstly in September for the Coleraine Borough 50+ information event, which hosted more than 200 older people as well as a number of exhibitors. Then, in October Ballymoney Evergreen Club warmly welcomed the Commissioner, who gave an overview of his role and answered questions on scams, the cost of living crisis and GP appointments. The club are Northern Ireland's longest running older peoples' group.

reminded the audience of our local saying 'Our Health is our Wealth' but pointed out that if politicians don't prioritise and invest in our health system we will all be much poorer. The Commissioner said that by mid-2027, the number of people aged 65 and over will outnumber children in Northern Ireland. Other key note speakers included Mary Peters, Ambassador for Age NI and Professor Max Watson, Palliative Care Clinician amongst others.


Words of wisdom with...Gloria Hunniford
